

WINNER: Sonnets of Love and Joy Paul Buchheit, Chicago, IL

From the sumptuous front cover to reviewing the well-earned accolades on the back, the reader is transported into another world, one where the beauty of art, nature, language, and the beloved are still proper subjects for the poet's pen and where intimacy with friends, family, and lovers can still be celebrated with passion and joy. The sonnets on their own are masterfully written but rise to another dimension as ekphrastic poems. Each sonnet avoids the pitfalls of description and instead focuses on how the artwork affected the poet's soul. The poems here may look Olde Tyme in form but they are timeless in content and effect. The author has given us a rare gift—a few hours of respite from a strident world in which to once again embrace the joy of lush language and unapologetic love.





RUNNER-UP: Aligned with the Sky Kathy Lohrum Cotton, Anna, IL

The author writes with eloquence, unflinching honesty, and realistic optimism about connection to other humans, to nature, to the cosmos, and to one's own soul. The writing is at times playful, poignant, stark, nostalgic, or struck with wonder, but it is never dull and always relatable. The author's real forte is metaphor, and the ability to sustain it in lovely language.


