President's Message



Poems have been submitted for our next anthology. This biennial collection is one of the benefits of ISPS membership and a popular way to share with each other and those who have an opportunity to read the poetry. As always, the topics and styles vary and create optimal insights and reading pleasure.

One of the themes that has occurred more than once is Covid in its various iterations. The need to express our fears, loneliness, gratitude to the caretakers, and efforts to cope with a pandemic are some of the common threads that have been addressed.

Poetry offers this opportunity to share our views of whatever concerns us. We poets are fortunate to have the ability to express these ideas in a compact and literary format that focuses on the heart of a subject in an explicit, artistic and interesting way.

What do nature, politics, familial and friendship ties, among other topics, have to say to us? What can we learn from daily events and connections and how can we condense our creativity into the essence of chosen topics? Sometimes it's helpful to sit or go for a walk and think about ideas. When some thoughts occur, record them on your phone or carry a little tablet of paper and a pen. Some good ideas can fly away if not held fast.

While thinking about what to write next, keep in mind that our annual fall contest will offer opportunities to put your work out for a little competitive word jousting. Summer can be a relaxing time to open the floodgates of word possibilities. What good ideas may be hiding among blooms and green leaves, cheerful bird calls, longer days into shorter nights? What can we learn from living in each precious moment that offers both the good and bad news of our lives? Naomi Shihab Nye's poem "A Single Slice Reveals Them" finds deeper meaning in an apple:

An Apple on the table hides its seeds so neatly under seamless skin. But we talk and talk and talk to let somebody in.

Upcoming Poetry Events at Brewed Awakening

For over 15 years, ISPS has been co-sponsoring a monthly poetry reading with Brewed Awakening in Westmont. During the pandemic, we made the events hybrid so you can listen in and even participate in the open mic via Zoom if you are unable to attend in person. We are also featuring and encouraging young poets, coupling them with seasoned poets. These events take place from 12:30-2:00 p.m. on the last Sunday of every month except December. The \$12 cover charge for those who come to Brewed Awakening entitles them to coffee and a snack. There is a \$5 charge for the Zoom link. Complete information (*including the Zoom link*) is posted on our ISPS website at illinoispoets.com. We always have an open mic.

The featured poets for July are ISPS President **Susan Moss** and **Kara Pucket**, a high school student whose poetry has been winning awards. The August reading will feature **Maggie Kennedy**, a newer poet, along with **Al DeGenova**, who is well known in the Chicago poetry community. The September reading will feature **John Gordon**, long-time member of ISPS who is known for his humor and his poems of social conscience. He is paired with **Hana Ferguson**, a college student whose writing has been nourished for a number of years by the Rockford Writers' Guild.

Kara Pucket is a lifelong resident of Illinois who will be starting her senior year of high school after this summer. Last year, her poem "Hands" won fifth place in the Manningham Trust Poetry Competition at the national level. Kara's awards also include: 3rd place for her dramatic scene "Deep Spaces" in this year's Dukane Literary Festival and 3rd place in short fiction at last year's Dukane Literary Festival for her short story "Amber." Her current projects also include a choose-your-own-adventure story and the screenplay for a TV show.

Susan T. Moss is the author of three books of poetry including one full-length collection entitled *Mapping A Life* and two chapbooks, *In From The Dark* and *Keep Moving 'til The Music Stops*. Her work has appeared in numerous publications including *Vermont Literary Review, Caduceus, After Hours, the Kerf, Steam Ticket* and *Soundings Door County in Poetry*. Susan has read her work on WLUW-FM and Highland Park cable television's "Poetry Today." Further credits include two Illinois Humanities fellowships and a month-long residency at the Vermont Studio Center. Presently, she is serving a sixth term as president of Illinois State Poetry Society. Susan holds a Master of Arts from Middlebury College Bread Loaf School of English.

Maggie Kennedy spends early mornings staring out her window at a row of sycamores towering over her neighborhood in Brookfield, Ill. Once in a while, a poem comes along. Her work has appeared in *Epiphany*, *Meat for*

Tea, Cloudbank, Atticus Review, and other publications. She says she got the creative writing bug by studying under Brice Guernsey at Eastern Illinois University. She went on to get a Masters in English and creative writing from the University of Chicago.

Al DeGenova is a poet, publisher, and teacher. He is the author of four books of poetry and three chapbooks. His most recent book is *Black Pearl: poems of love, sex and regret*; his collection of haibun and poetry, *Postcards to Jack,* was

recently released in a second expanded edition. His chapbook, *Mama's Blues*, is forthcoming this August from Finishing Line Press. His work has also appeared in numerous journals and anthologies. He received his MFA from Spalding University in Louisville. He is the founder of After Hours Press and co-editor of After Hours magazine, a journal of Chicago writing and art, which launched in June of 2000. DeGenova is also a blues saxophonist and one-time contributing editor to *Down Beat* magazine. He splits his time now between Sturgeon Bay, WI, and the metro Chicago area.

John J. Gordon developed his interest in poetry later in life. He began writing poems for family and friends to commemorate special occasions. Poetry classes, workshops and group memberships followed. He is currently a

member of ISPS, Poets & Patrons and the Arbor Hill Gang. Among many topics, he writes about family, travel, music

and social conditions, using free verse and rhymes. He appreciates accessible poetry where extensive explanations are not required. His poems are published in anthologies, reviews, journals and online.

Hana Ferguson is a full-time Rockford University student majoring in English and history and has one year before receiving her bachelor's degree. Hana works part-time at a local library and part-time at an antique shop. She is the recording secretary of the Rockford Writers' Guild. In her (little) free time, Hana likes to read, write, paint, and spend time with her fiancé and brother.

- 1. Eligibility. Contest is open to anyone.
- Original, unpublished work. Not in print or published electronically.
- Previous Awards. Poems which have won monetary awards are not eligible.

4. Poem format

- In English.
- Typed or computer-generated, 12 or 14 point; no fancy fonts or illustrations.
- 40-line limit, unless specified.
- One single-spaced poem per 8.5" x 11" page.
- **5. Titles.** Except haiku, title all poems. Title and one following blank line are not included in the line count.
- **6. Poems.** No poem may be submitted in more than one caterogy.
- Simultaneous Awards. No poet will win two awards in the same category.

8. Submit two copies of each poem:
Originals. In the upper left-hand
corner include: Number and name
of contest; your name, address,
e-mail, and phone number; the
word "MEMBER" if you have current membership in ISPS.

Duplicates. In the upper left-hand corner include ONLY number and name of contest.

Two Stacks. Separate originals from duplicates and stack in numerical order with originals on top.

Entry Fees

- ISPS Members: \$8 for up to 8 poems, \$1 each additional poem.
- NON-ISPS MEMBERS, \$10 for up to 8 poems, \$1 each additional poem.

SUBMISSION PERIOD

Submissions must be postmarked:

September 1 to October 31, 2022

Of sliding into evening, where we wish to follow Whatever sway will take our moments 'til tomorrow.


